


Vocabulary				
abstract	(in art) not intended to look realistic; reality is represented with colour and shape			
Cubism	an artistic movement that started in France in 1907 - a type of abstract art			
brushwork	the way in which the painter uses their brush			
linear	using lines and outlines			
overwork	to go back to your painting, before it is dry, and keep working			
observational	(in art) to draw or paint as realistically as possible			
still life	depicts mostly inanimate objects, typically commonplace objects either natural or man-made			
natural form	(in art) an object in its original form: not altered or manipulated			



Cubism was led by Pablo Picasso and Georges Braque. It is characterised by the use of geometric planes and shapes. Works of Pablo Picasso that consist of interlocking shapes and geometric planes are examples of cubism.

Patrick Heron used simple natural forms as the starting point for the lines and shapes in many of his paintings.
